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Community supports Telugu prog at Berkeley

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BAY Area Telugu teacher Mruthyumiayadu Taticamala was all smiles at the recent town hall meeting to initiate an endowed chair for Telogu Language Studies at the University of Berkeley. The town hall meeting was held last July 16 at the Miloitas Public library and attended by about 35 people. In a testament to the large poo

ulation of Telugu speaking people and their interest in keeping the culture language and customs of Andhra Pradesh alive, the meeting was attended by several interested people representing associations from across Northern California. The Teluga Initiative at UC Berkeley is spearheaded by Professor Vemuri of University of California, Davis. Professor Vemuri briefly outlined the history and significance of this effort in context of increased interest in Teluga language including naming Telugu as a Classical Language, and also related incidents like the uncoming US Consulate in Hyderabad, the interest in Andhra Pradesh in general.



Vemuri informed that the classes will commence in Fall semester 2007, for which the community will collect at least \$200,000 by December 2006. A minimum commitment of \$1 million is required to launch the endowment program.

Restaurateur Jayram Komati suggested that raising \$200,000 would not be a problem and even raising \$1 million was foreseeable given the number of Telugu associations across the country.
